
EPEDC Volunteer of the Year

East Pittsburgh Slovak Social Club Apartments



When the Mon Valley
Initiative (MVI) first
acquired the prominent
corner property at 501
Main Street, it was a
vacant, blighted former
nuisance bar that stood
adjacent to a community

playground and gym, as well as an MVI-owned building. The owner of the property expressed a willingness to give the property away.

MVI and members of the East Pittsburgh Economic Development Corporation (EPEDC) immediately investigated the property and determined that water damage to the upper floors made the building infeasible for rehabilitation.

Next door, however, the former Slovak Social Club was closing due to lack of membership, and its headquarters were up for sale. That building included a decent first floor open space with a prominent bar and small kitchen, topped with two

apartment units which had not been occupied in years.

The availability of the two properties proved an interesting proposal, so MVI purchased both in 2008. The first floor space was immediately leased to a boxing academy and gym relocating from Turtle Creek.

A second phase of redevelopment and the transformation of this visible corner is now in motion. Working with EPEDC and Lami Grubb Architects, MVI laid out four loft style, one bedroom units that share a common laundry. Every attempt has been made to maintain and restore the historic exterior while creating highly efficient and marketable rental units. Smaller units help add to the mix of MVI-owned rental properties in East Pittsburgh, which includes 9 large family units on Bessemer Avenue.

Disaster Restoration Services (DRS) won the bid for construction, and MVI is in the process of securing permits. Construction is to start in late 2014/early 2015. Based on current interest level and existing waiting lists, MVI expects that all four units would be preleased.

There was the Star Market for large grocery purchases and Brown's, Grofic's, Yankes's, and Poach's if you just needed a loaf of bread or a quart of milk or penny candy. Fresh fruits and vegetables were purchased from Jimmy the Greengrocer.

You could get your prescriptions filled at Terrace Pharmacy, Harry Hohman's or Brozda's and sit at their soda fountain counter and have a sundae, milk shake, or frozen Lemon Blennd and spin on the stools while you waited. Doc Newhouse made house calls and also had office hours in his home on Franklin Street. If you had a toothache, you saw Doctor Lloyd or Doctor Nevin.

Clothes need cleaned or repaired? There was Nick the Tailor & Dry Cleaner on Bessemer Avenue and Ton fixed everyone's shoes. Cars were repaired by the O'Hara Brothers or Willie Visco.

On Saturday night, you could catch a first-run movie at the Terrace Theater or bowl at the Terrace

Lanes. The guys who worked at the mill and Westinghouse had their after-work beers at Alexander's, Kelly's, or Barman's. If you were a

member, you could socialize at the VFW, the Fireman's Club, the Slovak Club, or the GBU.


