Adult cats that cannot be adopted follow the TNR protocols where they are spay/neutered and have their ear clipped so you can recognize these cats.

We have engaged Axis Architecture to help in planning a suitable replacement for this critically important center of the community.


Over the coming months we will have additional information to share as we continue to move towards a future of growth for East Pittsburgh.

Regional Police Update

East Pittsburgh is committed to bringing back a local police department. The State Police have, and are continuing to do an excellent job within our borough, but we also know that we need more regular local patrols and the ability to enforce our local laws.

To help us reach this goal East Pittsburgh has partnered with Braddock and Rankin to form a planning commission to develop a plan for a regional police department that would patrol all three boroughs. During a preliminary

study North Braddock decided to opt out of this partnership.

The three participating municipalities are receiving technical assistance from the Department of Community and Economic Development which also sponsored the original study.

While specific budgets and details will need to be worked out, the goals of the regional police department are to be able to hire full time police officers, set high standards for community policing, professionalism, and accountability. While increasing expectations we will be increasing wages and benefits. We also expect to significantly decrease turnover and overtime so that officers are not forced to work double shifts or for multiple departments to make a living wage.

As this process moves forward we will be keeping residents up to date through this newsletter, our website and our Facebook page.

The development and implementation of this plan is expected to last through 2021.

Code Enforcement and Public Safety

In our work to improve the appearance of the Borough, Council has recently enacted or begun enforcing ordinances (see next page). Over the coming months expect Council to take up additional measures to encourage property owners to maintain their land and buildings. Any proposed changes will be advertised and will also be available in the borough office or website for public view and comment prior to approval.

Winter Sidewalk Requirements

All property owners are responsible for snow and ice removal to be completed within 24 hours of the end of a snow event. Our DPW staff will plow and/or salt the streets as quickly as possible in preparation and during a snow or ice event. Let's have a safe winter!

Trash Reminders

No garbage containers are permitted to be placed along the roadway or alley until the night before garbage pick up, which is Wednesday evening after 6:00pm. (Section 58.1) The only time this changes is during a Holiday, which will back garbage pick up one day. Thanksgiving will delay pickup by one day. There will not be any delays for Christmas or New Years.

Streets

It is well known that parking is very limited in the borough. In response to numerous resident complaints the borough has responded two ways to help keep on street parking available. Please help us to keep our borough attractive by following the ordinances and keeping the streets clear.

<u>Parking Chairs</u> In October the borough began enforcing its "parking chair" ordinance. Anyone wishing to collect their chairs, cones and other items may contact the Borough Office at

412-823-7124. Any items stored for 30 days or longer will be disposed of. The "Pittsburgh parking chair" will not be removed during a snow event.

Residents who have had chairs, cones, or buckets removed may pick up their items at the Community Center on November 22, 2020 from 9 am to 4 pm. Any items left will be disposed of. Future dates will be on December 17, 2020 and January 21, 2021.



<u>Nuisance Vehicles</u> The Borough Code states that it is "unlawful to store, park or place any unregistered, uninspected, inoperative, unlicensed, junked, or nuisance motor vehicle or trailer on any premises not designated for that use, whether such premises shall be public or pri-

vate" We are tagging vehicles that are uninspected or inoperative, and having them removed from the streets and alleys.
