The Mayor's Desk:

Neighbors,

I hope this writing finds you and your families well.

The purpose of this article is to draw attention to the current state of affairs of our nation and the world and what it means to us and our community. It is similar to, based in part on and validates the necessity of a previously written article a couple of issues ago concerning preparedness.

I will preface this writing with the fact that I typically would not come to you with such a dire message, but it is just a reflection of the world and times we are living in. It is with this in mind that I find it necessary to reiterate that previous message because there is a storm on the horizon and it is fast approaching. As such, It is my duty as mayor to ensure that you, my neighbors, are aware of this and make the most of the opportunity before you to make the best and necessary preparations possible for you and your families.

There are troubling times ahead. If you have not been paying attention the world is facing the real possibility of a food shortage. This is for several reasons: weather patterns, politically based decreases in planting and harvesting, economic upheaval, inflation and war all have it appear that we are headed in that direction.

The indicators are everywhere that this will have a serious impact on everyone except the most wealthy (I don't know about you, but I don't know anyone in that category). And it's not only food. The costs of everything food, fuel, clothing, utility bills are all increasing. These and many other items may become not only unaffordable, but also unobtainable. But, without food nothing else matters. I was grocery shopping recently and realized that the cost of what was in my cart has almost doubled in the last three years. As if this was not enough officials are warning that certain foods, more specifically wheat products and sunflower oil, are items that are expected to disappear from grocery store shelves. According to some dietary experts; through bread and breakfast cereals to pastas and pastries, Americans consume approximately 180 lbs of wheat per person every year. And though you may not use or cook directly with sunflower oil it is used in many products that you may buy, increasing the cost of those items if they can be had at all due to the war in Europe. Property Maintenance Reminders

With our recent rains this is the time to think about your property maintenance. Grass and other plant

growth must be kept at a height of less than 10 inches—well past your ankle. Trees and shrubs must also be kept trimmed so as not to interfere with sidewalks, streets, and alleyways.

Spring and summer is also when we see **mosquitos and other pests**. Tires and other objects that could hold standing water should be covered or emptied on a regular basis.

Trash needs to be placed into waste cans with a lid in order to prevent animals from tearing open your trash bags. Trash that is left out and scattered by animals or others will be ticketed under Ord. 929 and Chapter 315 of the Borough Code.

stated that both Russia and Ukraine produce about 30 percent of the world's wheat crops. And, while it is true that the United States is in the top five of world wheat producers (coming in at number three), she only produces 6 to 7 percent of the worlds wheat consumption. And much of the grain that is produced will go to other countries as we are a major exporter of that wheat.

Also, the most recent strain of avian or "Bird Flu", according to PETA (People for Ethical Treatment of Animals), has resulted in 27 million chickens and turkeys having been culled since February 2022 to prevent the spreading of this disease.

Add to all of this that 100,000 Ukrainians will be, rightfully, welcomed into the country as quickly as possible with the end goal of uniting them with family members already living here. This is in addition to the 210,000 migrants that have entered the country via Mexico in March 2022 alone.

What does this mean for us? It's pretty simple really; an increasing population with decreasing food supply and a potentially expanding war means the very serious potential for a food shortage in this country and this is what we need to prepare for.

Please, take advantage of this time fill your pantries and start a victory garden. Any and everything you do now can make a great difference later. Make sure you start working towards the emergency supply kit I listed in the previous article. That kit should include but not be limited to food, water, clothing, extra blankets, candles matches or lighters, battery operated devices (flashlights, radios etc.) with varying battery sizes, medications and first aid kits, toiletries and cleaning supplies (bleach, clothing and dish detergent- also for floor, tub and toilet) and garbage bags. Remember, with approximately 350 million people in this country, there may not be enough assistance from any of the numerous agencies to provide for everyone...if any at all.

With the warmer weather, open windows, and spring/summer projects upon us, please remember to be respectful of your neighbors.


- Keep late night noise and loud music to a minimum.

Trax Alley Playground Opens

The Borough of East Pittsburgh opened its newest playground on Trax Alley on Friday, March 18, 2022. The new playground was built on a lot that had served as an ice rink in the 1970's and is less than a block away from the outdated playground it is replacing on Bessemer Ave.

"We are here to welcome the positive. The children in East Pittsburgh have a new, safe, and quite lovely playground," said Council President Mary Carol Kennedy, who has been working on this project since she joined East Pittsburgh Council 9 years ago.

Ms. Kennedy thanked all the vendors who worked to make this playground a reality. Funding for this project was provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Community and Economic Development, The Borough of East Pittsburgh and US Steel Corporation. Senator Brewster believes that every town has tax payers who deserve to see a return in their investment when grant programs are available, and provided the support to obtain the grant from DCED in 2021.

What is LIHWAP?

The Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is a temporary emergency program to help low-income families pay overdue water bills. LIHWAP is a grant. You do not have to repay it.

To receive help...

- · Apply starting January 4, 2022.
- You don't have to be on public assistance.
- · You need to have an unpaid water bill.
- · You can either rent or own your home.

How does LIHWAP work?

LIHWAP Crisis grants may be available if you have an emergency situation and are in jeopardy of losing your water service. You can receive one Crisis grant for your drinking water service and one Crisis grant for your wastewater service, up to \$2.500 each.

Crisis situations include:

- Past-due water bills.
- · Termination of utility service.
- Danger of having utility service terminated (received a notice that service will be shut off within the next 60 days).

How do I apply?

- Apply online at www.compass.state.pa.us.
- Request an application by calling the Statewide Customer Service Center at 877-395-8930 or call PA Relay at 711 for the hearing impaired.
- Applications are available at your local county assistance office.

To apply, you will need:

- · Names of people in your household;
- · Dates of birth for all household members:
- Social Security numbers for all household members;
- · Proof of income for all household members; and
- A recent water bill.

Who is eligible?

You may qualify for a LIHWAP grant if:

- You must have an overdue water bill that you are responsible for paying.
- Your household income meets the following income guidelines:

After your application is processed, you will receive a written notice that will tell you if you qualify. If eligible, it will tell you the amount of your grant.
